Letter	Meaning	Brief Explanation
S	Security and Safety	Everyone has the right to live in safety and be protected from violence, abuse and harm.
A	Access to Education	Every child has the right to education and the opportunity to learn and develop their potential regardless of gender, ethnicity, religion, disability or background.
F	Fair Treatment	Everyone should be treated with dignity, respect and without discrimination.
E	Equality	All people are equal before the law and deserve the same rights and opportunities regardless of gender, ethnicity, religion, disability or background.
L	Liberty (Freedom)	People have the freedom to make lawful choices, move freely, worship and live without unlawful detention.
I	Information and Expression	Everyone has the right to access information, express their opinions and share ideas responsibly.
F	Fair Justice	Every person has the right to a fair hearing and equal treatment in the justice system regardless of gender, ethnicity, religion, disability or background.
E	Essential Needs	Everyone has the right to basic needs such as food, clean water, healthcare, housing and a clean environment.
